The annual awards honor those who have made significant contributions to quality and innovation in the delivery of cancer care across the province.

The CQCO Innovation Award, which recognizes and rewards the development of new processes or products, or organizations which are bold, experimental, risky, or far-reaching and which enhance and improve cancer care performance in Ontario, was presented to the CanWell program.

A collaboration between the YMCA of Hamilton/Burlington/Brantford, Hamilton Health Sciences, the Juravinski Cancer Centre and McMaster University, CanWell is a community-based exercise and education program for individuals with any type of cancer, at any stage of their illness. CanWell was developed to help cancer survivors regain their pre-cancer physical abilities and enhance their physical well being through an exercise and education program offered at the YMCA, which is accessible for many people in the community.

"We are pleased to have been able to work with our partners from Hamilton Health Sciences and McMaster University in developing this much needed program for those living with cancer, and feel honored to be recognized with the 2010 Innovation Award," said Genevieve Hladysh, general manager community health program development, YMCA of Hamilton/Burlington/Brantford. "The CanWell program has truly been innovative in helping to expand the continuum of care for individuals and families in our community and is helping to increase the awareness of the benefits of exercise in the fight against cancer."
